Sample Schedules for Freshman/Sophomore Business and Accounting Majors

This sequence has been created to assist freshman and sophomore students meet the requirements for admission to the Bloch School's business and accounting degree programs. Transfer and dual credit courses completed prior to admission to UMKC may require changes in these suggested sequences. Consult your advisor for additional information.

All suggested schedules include 13-16 hours of coursework. Students can opt for a lighter load and enroll in courses during the summer or take an additional semester to complete the requirements.

^{**} Business Administration students complete seven hours of elective in their first two years. Accounting students need only four hours of elective for their entire program.

^{***}Students in Business Administration are required to take Econ 302 as their advanced economics course. Accounting students can select from Econ 301, Macroeconomic Analysis; Econ 302, Microeconomic Analysis or Econ 331, Money and Banking (instructor approval required)
